



## ARTS 2180: Color Photography

### **Course Description:**

Photographs play an important role in our daily life. We can see photographs everywhere. This course is an introduction to color photography. Students will explore the usage of color and light with the medium of digital photography. Introductions on the roles of digital cameras and functions of light and color are both essential topics in the course. In addition, we will also discuss some photographer and their images and do some analysis with the language of critique.

### **Course Objectives:**

At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Interpret concepts in photography and color theory and apply them to their artworks with a focus on light and color
- Use the language of critique to analyze or comment on the photographs
- Apply appropriate techniques of color management for color correction
- Develop proper topics and themes and choose proper methods to create their own photography projects

### **Course Assignments:**

#### **Participation**

### **Writing assignments**

There are two writing assignments during the course.

Artist's Statement: This is a two-page statement, in which you should discuss your working process and reflect on the appropriateness of the working method to the concept.

Analysis Paper: This is a three-page analysis paper, in which you should choose one photographer and one image (this should be approved by the instructor), and then write an analysis paper on it. The detailed rubric will be assigned by the instructor.

### **Photography Assignments**

There are three photography assignments. In these assignments, you should provide a general framework for technical practice and for exploring issues in photography and camera operation. The rationale and expected outcome for each assignment is different. The rubric for each assignment will be provided by the instructor.

### **Final project**

You can select a topic or theme to finish your final project. Before you start, you should get approval from the instructor about your topic or theme. The images in your final project should be in line with the topic or theme you choose. The prints should be carefully produced. Other detailed requirements will be released by the instructor.
