

### **POL 1310: Introduction to World Politics**

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## **Course Description:**

This course examines the "big questions" in world politics: Why do countries fight wars? Can nuclear proliferation be curtailed? Does trade help developing countries or harm them? Topics include rise, development and changes of the nation-state system; patterns and causes of international conflict and cooperation; the environment, redistribution of wealth, security and human rights; international law, organizations, and transnational institutions; the roles of both state and non-state actors in international politics; and the methods used to understand this field.

#### Homework:

A closed-book final exam will be taken at the end of the session. The final exam is cumulative and worth 35% of the final grade.
