Course Description:

Human-beings are social animals. Thus, interpersonal communication is important and inevitable. This course will introduce students the basic theories and practical methods of interpersonal communication. Topics includes self, perception, emotions, verbal and nonverbal communication, listening, conflict and relationships with romantic partners and family members. The class enables students to explore the complexities of interpersonal communication and to enhance their skills in interpersonal communication.

Course Assignments:

Presentations

Students are required to give 2 individual presentations and 1 group presentation. The individual presentation shall be about 3-4 minutes in length and the group presentation shall consist of 2-3 group members with each student presenting for 3-4 minutes. All presentations will be assessed by: 1. selecting an appropriate topic 2. Audience analysis and adaptation 3. Preparing an outline when required 4. Providing appropriate transitions and summaries 5. Developing effective intros and conclusions 6. Using an appropriate organizational pattern 7. Using supporting material and research properly and effectively h. using visual aids effectively, and 8. Displaying appropriate verbal and nonverbal behaviors when presenting the material.

Papers

There will be three paper assignments, including two activity reports based on learned chapters and a literature review on topics about interpersonal communication. The papers together will count for 30% of your grade for the course. Each paper will count equally to 10%. Topics will be made available two weeks before papers are due. All papers must be double spaced, in 12-point Times New Roman font, with 1" margins all around.

Midterm Exam

An in-class, close-book and non-cumulative midterm exam will be given through this course.



The midterm exams will be based on the knowledge covered in class. No excuse will be accepted if students do not have legitimate excuses for absence. Physician Statement is required for missing the exam due.

Final Exam

The final will be close-book, consisting of multiple choice, fill in the blank, true/false, short-answer and essay questions, covering material from the entire term, including in-class discussion content. Note that the final will not be taken during the normal class times. Exact time and location for final will be announced later.
