Course Description:

This is an introductory level Japanese language learning course designed for beginners. This course will introduce students to the fundamentals of modern Japanese, aiming to help students foster the four language skills including speaking, listening, reading and writing, as well as Japanese culture awareness. This course, closely following the textbook and focused on the frequently-used communicative situations, will familiarize students with the Japanese sound and language structure by mastering its three writing systems: hiragana, katakana, and kanji.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of the course, you will be able to:

- 1.read and write hiragana, katakana, and over 50 kanji characters;
- 2.comprehend and practice spoken language based on chapter topics and vocabulary;
- 3.read and comprehend written Japanese passages or conversations based on chapter topic and vocabulary;
- 4.introduce and express yourself regarding various common situations;
- 5.develop basic knowledge of Japanese culture:
- 6.prepare for further level Japanese language learning.
